## Fines for noise

## violations increase

Starting today, students will receive a \$125 fine for noise violations. The previous fine was \$50.

Gainesville City
Commissioners unanimously
approved the increase that also
will affect other property-related violations, such as trash and
yard maintenance, Monday.

"You vote that thing down, and the budget is all messed up," City Commissioner Tony Domenech said about his reluctant decision to vote for the increase.

Fines are a revenue source for the city.

However, Mayor Tom Bussing said earlier that the fine's intention was to gain compliance, not revenue. He said high fines were sometimes necessary to get residents to follow the law.

Domenech, who voted for the increase three times, said he did not agree with it but chooses not to fight this battle.

"It was not a battle I wanted to emotionally or psychologically fight," he said. "There seemed to be a strong will on the commission [for the increase]."

Bussing and Domenech agree about further increases to a fine against towing companies.

Towing companies are fined for improperly towing vehicles from private property.

Bussing said he considered a \$250 fine; Domenech said that number might be too low.

The maximum the city could charge for the fine would be \$500, according to Florida law.

The Ignite and Student Alliance parties again were absent in voicing their concerns during the debate. Both promised to be the students' voices during Fall elections.
