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## Bonner leads UF in win against Vols

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Tennessee was close to good. Matt Bonner was close to unconscious.

On a night where nothing could go wrong for the UF forward, he had his best shooting game of the year with 25 points as the No. 6 Gators outmuscled Tennessee 77-64 in the O'Connell Center.

It seemed the senior couldn't miss. At any time where Tennessee (8-4, 1-2 Southeastern Conference) would make a small run, Bonner was the blockade with his 9-of-14 shooting from the field and 5 of 7 from the three-point line.

He also contained Tennessee forward Ron Slav, who averaged 22 points per game before Wednesday, to 17 points on 7-of-24 shooting.

"What I tried to do offensively with him was make Slay have to run around and guard him," UF coach Billy Donovan said. "I think Matt played an exceptional game on both ends of the floor."

The Gators (14-2, 3-0 SEC) took a 7-4 lead in the first few minutes that they never relinquished. Tennessee reduced the lead to 9 points in the second half, but no one could be the ignition after Slay struggled.

"[Slay] put a little too much

into his head.

"Slay, he's got some antics," said Bonner, who said he played against Slay for the first time when he was 15 years old. "Every time we play against each other it's going to be a

By the time Peterson called a timeout with 8 minutes, 43 seconds left in the second half, the Gators were ahead by 15 after a no-look pass to center David Lee from guard Brett Nelson.

"To start the second half, our intensity level wasn't where it was to start the game," Donovan said. "When we subbed, that is when we got our lead."

Lee finished with 14 points and seven rebounds while Brett Nelson may have had his best game of the season.


Trying to return from his nightmarish shooting slump this year, the senior started hitting 15-foot jumpers in the second half instead of settling for errant three-pointers.

He looked more comfortable than he has all season, recording five assists in 30 minutes.

His first three-pointer rimmed out - the story all season - but once he started connecting by taking that extra dribble, everything clicked.

"I've been shooting a lot lately," Nelson said. "I've been coming in at night after prac-
